



The RSPB

1. Eat ethically – It is becoming increasingly clear that reducing the meat in our diet is vital in reducing the impact of the climate crisis. Going veggie or vegan would help reduce environmental-damaging livestock farming.

OR Try reducing meat intake to once/twice a week.

ALSO eating locally sourced food will help reduce emissions associated with shipping and transport.

- 2. Switch to green energy.
 Use LED light bulbs, do not leave devices on standby and consider installing solar panels.
- 3. Opt for sustainable clothing. Reuse, repair or recycle. Limit how often you buy new clothes. Consider where they are sourced from and choose natural fibres over plastics. Buy second

hand or arrange a clothes swap.

4. Use alternatives to cling film. Use eco-friendly wraps, repurpose glass jars, visit zero waste shops.

- 5. Make your commute a green one. Cycle or walk; car share.
- 6. Give nature a home. Allow an area in your garden to re-wild. Plant wild flowers and other pollinator- friendly plants. Let grass grow to flower instead of keeping it short. Plant trees. Judy Ford (our Eco Rep)

You may remember that last month I wrote about a book I had been recommended called 'L' is for Lifestyle and said that over the next few months I'd take the letter of the month and share what the book says about it.

This month then is 'O' and in the book for 'O' is 'Organic'. MAKING A HOUSE A HOME

As some of you will know our Worcester house is currently covered in scaffolding. Α kitchen extension will follow the work in the loft. Since aettina married in



1980 we have lived in twelve different houses and being in the ministry haven't, until now, been free to knock down any walls! At some point here we will be banished to our dining room with a kettle and a microwave until the new kitchen emerges. We have coped before with a lot worse.

Our first flat in Zaire where we with the Church served Missionary Society in the mid 80's (see top left balcony with curtains in the photo) had been a hotel suite in its day. I use the word 'suite' lightly as it was very run down and needed a lot of cleaning from day one to make it anything like homely. There was a living space, bedroom and bathroom but no kitchen so we prepared food and cooked on the balcony and washed up in the bathroom sink. When the water was off we had a pulley system using buckets, filled up from across the road, thanks to a kind Greek barber.

Many years on we are now happily retired and settled in this neighbourhood. We are thankful for a comfortable home that reflects our

tastes and is furnished with memories of travels and family. We are also wanting to make new friends and have always enjoyed showing hospitality. Despite the building works we are looking forward to hosting a new home group, starting on September 25th and promise to provide a hot drink!

As we approach Harvest Festival weekend, with our gifts going to MAGGS and the Food Bank, we will be remembering those who have fallen on hard times and may not even have a roof over their head. And of course not every home is a happy place.

When we are blessed with a home we enjoy we pray not only that we will use it wisely but that we will remember that people and relationships are always more important than bricks and mortar.

PARISH GIVING SCHEME - A THIRD ALTERNATIVE

Those of you who are in the Planned Giving Scheme currently make vour weekly or monthly offering by one of two methods. namely envelopes on the plate or monthly standing order through your bank. These might be Giftthev might Aided or not. depending vour circumstances. The cash in the envelopes has to be counted and banked, the church treasurer has to add the plate collections and the standing orders into the accounts, and the Gift-Aid Coordinator (that's me) has to enter the giving into our gift-aid records and submit a quarterly claim to HMRC to get the gift-aid back. This is not a problem, we have well-organised processes to deal with all of this which work very efficiently.

However, as of this year there is now a third alternative, called the Parish Giving Scheme or PGS for short. This is a scheme which is operated as a partnership between the various dioceses. administered centrally and cost effectively out of an office in Gloucestershire, and funded by the dioceses at no cost to parishes. But it's still delivered at parish level. This alternative to envelopes or standing orders collects your giving by direct debit, similar to how many of your will be paying your gas, electricity and telephone bills.

The direct debit gift goes off to PGS on the first of the month, they collate it together, claim the gift-aid where appropriate, and send both back to the parish in an itemized report by the 10th of the month. Much less work for the treasurer's team and the Coordinator. Annual renewals, and increases where appropriate, are handled between you the giver and PGS, who will alter the direct debit if necessary, no need to contact the bank.

I'm not going to bore you with more detail than that, this is not an attempt to get you to change if you are happy with what you do now, it's just an offer of a third option if it would suit you better. There is no need to change, but if the idea should strike a chord with you, I'm happy to talk it through with you and I've got some very good literature I can hand out. Most of your PCC members have already signed up for it.

What do you think? Would it suit you better?

The The Myriad Centre is a Centre local charity in Worcester WR1, for young

people with a profound disability wanting to form relationships, make choices and enjoy activities, despite their serious impairments.

It is the Myriad Centre's passion that each individual is supported to engage with, and be seen within, the community, and achieve their potential so that their lives go beyond being cared for, to being valued for who they are as people.

Our vision is that every young person with profound and multiple disabilities across our region has the opportunity to lead a fun and fulfilled life. We do this by providing a wide range of specialist therapies and activities at our Centre, six days per week.

At the moment the centre are raising funds for a new Mini Bus. Someone cruelly stole one of their minibuses which thankfully they replace. finally managed to Unfortunately, that incident used funds which should have gone towards other things. They now need to replace another minibus which has done many thousands of miles transporting their clients around. They have been promised a new one but must raise £20k towards it. They are well on their way with £10k already raised, but are desperately in need of the rest before the minibus can do no

more!

Claire Summers Worcester 10k I've recently been working at the Myriad Centre in the finance department.. Meeting the clients and seeing how profound the disabilities can be, has made me very passionate about helping them. I work with the support workers who help do activities in and out of the centre, to give the clients the chance to have fun, and some wonderful experiences. I watch and hear the staff daily and know how hard they work and generally care for them. It really is a very rewarding thing to see and do. The clients and staff's enthusiasm amaze me daily.

I run as a hobby, to keep fit and help my own mental health. The Worcester 10k and half marathon is done every September, and I decided to help raise money for the centre.

I've so far raised £350 on Just Giving and with gift aid on top, nearly £400.
